This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

During the 2022 program year The City of Niagara Falls continued to still operate in a COVID environment and has made substantial progress toward the several of goals set. In 2022 the city continued prioritizing eliminating slum and blight and contined to provide affordable and quality housing. Some goals have not been achieved as that the activities associated with these goals have not been initiated as of yet, but will take place in the near future over the course of the 5 year Consolidated Plan/strategic Plan. The City has exceeded its goal in the areas of homeless assistance and prevention and owner occupied residential rehabilitation. The City also utilized their 15% Publice Service cap and provided funding to subrecipients to provide mant different services throughout the communuity such as youth services, neighborhood cleanups and mental health services.

The City has exceeded it annual goal for demolitions as 24 targeted clearance and demolition activities to remove blight and allow for green space and development activities were perfored during the 2022 program year. Due to the fact the there is a 1 year wait to pay a 5% retainage to assure project satisfactory, the activities can't be closed until such time and thus can't count toward the goal accomplishment.

The City also focused on Milling/Paving Street improvemnts in low to moderate income neighborhoods. Those streets included:

The City of Niagara Falls continued to benefit from the extra resources provided by the Federal Government to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus. This funding has been used to support activities carried forward from the 2019 Annual Action Plan that contained the amendment for Cares Act Funding.

The City continued to implement the sewer lateral program during the 2022 program year. The City has not been able to meet the goals set forth for this program and has only completed 1 project and currently has 3 ongoing open projects that there is a 1 year wait to pay a 5% retainage to

assure project satisfactory, the activities can not be closed out until such time.

Home ownership and homelss services were continued to be invested in as well.

The City also continued to prioritize the use of CARES Act funds throughout the community to prevent, prepare for, and respond to Coronavirus through local sub recipients.

A flexible, community-wide approach to improving and providing affordable housing for low- and moderate-income residents has helped strengthen Niagara Falls's neighborhoods. The administered programs achieved their intended results. The housing rehab programs assisted Niagara Falls's residents by enabling them to stay in their homes and allowed our residents to continue the dream of homeownership.

Niagara Falls also provided funds to assist in the Acquisition of Existing Units through the Closing Cost Assistance Program.

Niagara Falls continues to support the homeless by working with our sub recipients. One of the biggest emphasis' we had was providing rental assistance to the homeless. The City of Niagara Falls continues to work with its sub recipients to provide finds to meet the need for affordable housing. Operating in a pandemic environment has had an effect on the ability to meet some of the expected goals.

These outcomes will impact future annual action plans by supporting the continued funding for owner occupied housing repair as well as rental rehabilitation funding. It is anticipated that there will be a continued need for housing rehabilitation activities as Niagara Falls's housing stock continues to age. The City will likely continue to assist in the financing of the development of new, affordable rental units as well as for sale rehabilitation and new construction housing for low-income households, financing for homebuyer assistance as well as deferred loans to help preserve safe and affordable homeownership, which stabilizes neighborhoods.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Niagara Falls has continued to work with its sub recipients by funding outreach programs. The CoC has identified the need for outreach programs in the City of Niagara Falls. Thus, outreach is a component of the City's consolidated plan and yearly annual action plans. The City of Niagara Fall's via it's commitment to fund outreach and work with sub recipients and the CoC will aid in reducing and ending homelessness.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Niagara Falls funds a small network of Homeless service providers who work diligently in addressing the emergency shelter, transitional and permanent housing needs of homeless individuals. Shelter utilization was substantially lower this year to account for CDC regulations requiring reduced capacity to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The City's network of providers reacted swiftly to the rapid spread and evolution of the COVID-19 pandemic. All ESG-funded shelters remained open, albeit at limited capacity due to COVID, and helped keep the homeless community safe from infection. Most ESG recipients offer case management and works to get everyone placed on lists for housing using Coordinated Entry tools and HMIS data available.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Niagara Falls funded Catholic Charities, Community Missions of Niagara and the YWCA for Homelessness Prevention aimed at preventing individuals and families from losing their housing due to job loss, legal, or health-related issues. Neighborhood Legal Services continued their successful Housing Court Prevention Program, which offers legal assistance and landlord remediation to households facing eviction in housing courts. This legal assistance helps families stay their evictions, so they can make payment arrangements to maintain their housing. Both programs were vital throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. Shelter capacity was lower due to regulations which required these providers to prevent others from becoming homeless in the meantime.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Niagara Falls has worked closely with the CoC and the City's sub recipients to determine areas for improvement in reducing shelter stays and transitioning to permanent housing and independent living.

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The City of Niagara Falls Section 8 Leased Housing Department has awarded more Project Based Vouchers (PBVs), which will increase the availability of affordable public housing options. The Niagara Falls Housing Authority also works in conjunction with Section 8 Leased Housing to meet the needs of public housing and affordability.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City of Niagara Falls has awarded HUD funds to our sub recipients to provide financial counseling and home ownership education as preparation for homeownership. The city provides homeowership opportunities through usage of A Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher. The City also continued to offer direct financial closing cost assistance to qualified First Time Home Buyers.

The greatest obstacle that the city faces remains the limited community development dollars available from federal, state, local, and private sources. The overwhelming needs in Niagara Falls make it impossible to address everything that city leaders would like to improve. In response, The city met with the citizens as part of our Citizen Action Plan and the participatory budgeting approach to determine and assess the unmet needs of the underserved. In terms of meeting the unmet needs of the homeless, the City works with the local CoC and ESG sub recipients to determine this population needs. Information gathered is incorporated into our Annual Action Plan to meet the community needs

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City is actively a part of the Lead Coalition coordinated with the Niagara County Department of Health to address homes that are found to have children with Elevated Blood Lead Levels (EBLL) and lead-based paint hazards through both City and County-led programs. The City has a Lead Risk Assessor on staff and requires that all of its rehabilitated units undergo proper lead risk assessment and achieve required lead clearance. Also, the City provides funding to CHDOs for lead hazard remediation and toxic soil removal.

Lead inspection and clearence are a required part of each housing rehabilitation performed. Inspections are performed on all units aided through ESG Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Niagara Falls partnered with multiple organizations to help reduce the number of poverty-level families by addressing root causes of poverty and developing strategies and initiatives to sustain poverty reduction programs and collaboration and support organizations and programs that provide literacy, credit counseling and home ownership opportunity to strengthen opportunities for both employment and financial security.

The City put a significant focus on developing safe and affordable housing units through owner occupied rehabilitation and home ownership assistance programs.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Niagara Falls and the Department of Community Development continue to strive to improve the policies, procedures and resources available to ensure the success of our efforts and the compliance with grant regulations. The City's Dept. of Community Development is responsible for all fiscal administration and management of HUD grants. The City's Dept. of Finance is responsible for the drawdown of funds from HUD. This has involved a lengthy transition period and the development of new policies and procedures which is an on-going process.

The City of Niagara Falls is a member of the South End Housing Initiative, a group of local residents and organizations working towards offering more homeownership education and opportunities to residents within the South End. Members of local financial institutions, social service agencies are represented in this group.

The City of Niagara Falls implements monitoring with all contractors, subcontractors, agencies, CBO's, CHDO's and subreceipients of all CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds. Monitoring includes desk, onsite, technical, and ongoing monitoring levels based on risk factors, program type, and schedule. The annual Subrecipient agreement is the first source for monitoring of all Subrecipients. The Program descriptions, program budgets and related requirements provide an initial review and assessment before agreements are approved. The Subrecipient agreement informs the Subrecipient of the HUD rules and regulations and City of Niagara Falls policy requirements such as insurance and program reporting.

Aside from annual monitoring for each Entitlement Grant Subrecipient, both the City's Audit Department and the Contract Administration Unit review and approve all incoming requisitions to ensure they are compliant, reasonable, and contractually eligible. All Subrecipients are subject to annual reviews of audited financial statements and Single Audit reports.

The City of Niagara Falls will perform a risk assessment analysis of all sub recipients at the beginning of each program year. Monitored sub recipients will be provided a report of findings and given corrective action notice and a timeframe to complete corrective actions.

Each sub recipient is notified in their contracts to seek MWBE participation.

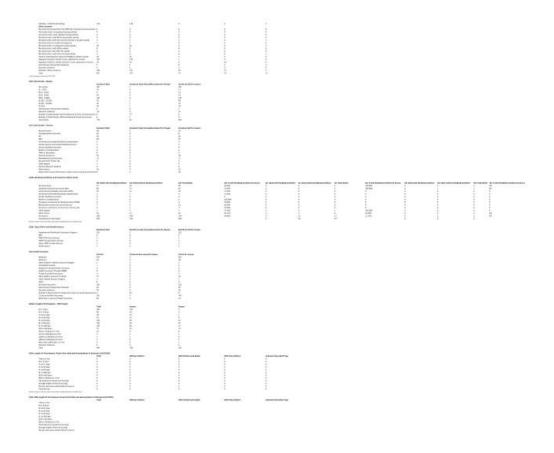
