The City of Niagara Falls advanced the following 2015-2019 Strategic Plan goals during its 2018 Annual Action Plan:

(1) Higher % of homeownership and renovation

The Housing Collaborative model was enacted during the 2018 Annual Action Plan. This model created better efficiency and standard housing renovation practices and products among all organizations that perform housing renovations using CDBG and HOME funding.

(2) City park/public space improvement

The City of Niagara Falls has continued to improve its city parks and public spaces during the 2018 Annual Action Plan. The City of Niagara Falls conducted a Participatory Budgeting (PB) process for public space improvements in three neighborhoods in 2018 that resulted in an exterior home improvement program, planned strategic demolitions, and funds available for a community center.

(3) Increase % of homeless persons in permanent housing

The City of Niagara Falls has been working closely with the Continuum of Care (CoC) to implement a Coordinated Entry system and other practices and procedures to increase the amount of homeless or at-risk of homelessness clients provided with and successfully maintaing permanent housing.

The City of Niagara Falls has expanded youth mental health services in the city with CDBG funds in support of ESG projects.

The City of Niagara Falls has narrowed its scope of projects to undertake in the 2018 Action Plan, which allows activities to interact and reinforce one another better. For example, Mental Health Youth Counseling fits well with the needs of the ESG projects; Adaptive reuse/converstion of 30 units for affordable housing will generate more project-based vouchers for the City of Niagara Falls Leased Housing Program; and Participatory Budgeting has led to planned improvements in the City's housing rehabilitation program.

Greater care needs to be taken to ensure that funded projects are in a phase where spenddown will happen quicker. While construction seasons and available funding do not often align, the City of Niagara Falls needs to better ensure that funds will be spent to realize goals and outcomes in a timely manner.

CDBG and HOME was matched with \$9,287,338 of state funds, and \$4,552,625 private funds. ESG was matched with \$6,140 City funds, \$55,550 of state funds and \$138,360 of private funds.

ESG matching requirements were met through subrecipient fundraising efforts, and in the case of YWCA of the Niagara Frontier, through the NYS Supportive Housing program. Matching documentation is provided to the City for every subrecipient draw request.

The City of Niagara Falls does not fund a street outreach program. The City of Niagara Falls has worked with the CoC to find alternative sources to fund a program. The City of Niagara Falls recognizes the importance of a street outreach program in reducing and ending homelessness and will try to fund such a program in future consolidated 5-year strategic plans.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Niagara Falls funds 3 emergency shelters and 1 transitional housing shelter. The transitional housing shelter has families that have stayed long term due to the needs of the families. The City of Niagara Falls Public Housing Authority will soon adopt a homeless preference for its Housing Choice Voucher and Project Based Voucher programs, which may be able to reduce the time spent in transitional housing shelters.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Niagara Falls funds a homelessness prevention program. Goals have been met for this program with the funding available.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Niagara Falls has worked closely with the CoC and the City's subrecipients to determine areas for improvement in reducing shelter stays and transitioning to permanent housing and independent living. The City's Public Housing Authority will soon adopt a homeless preference for its Housing Choice

Voucher and Project Based Voucher programs, which may allow homeless persons that do not require intensive case work to achieve affordable, safe housing without being an ESG client -- or helping those that require more financial assistance when they leave the ESG program.
